Seamen's Center of Wilmington Celebrates Sea Sunday



Joining with seafarer's centers and religious communities worldwide, the Seamen's Center of Wilmington will once again lead Delaware's Annual Sea Sunday on September 16. As part of the celebration, Delaware congregations are encouraged to pray for seafarers, their families, and those, like the dedicated volunteers and staff at the Seamen's Center, who minister to them. The public is also invited to be part of the Center's celebration that day from 3:00 to 6:00 p.m., starting with an ecumenical service at the Port. Following the service, the Center hosts an open house with refreshments, and the staff

leads tours of the Port of Wilmington. (Important note: All those planning to attend must have photo identification to enter the Port.)

Why do we give thanks and pray for seafarers? Why do we even have a Seamen's Center? As our world continues to "flatten," the role of international trade is impossible to over-state—and, in turn, the 10,000+ seafarers who visit the ports of Delaware each year are a vital link in our global and local economies. They need our prayers because much of this work is done in dangerous, isolated, and often exploitative conditions, raising important social justice questions for

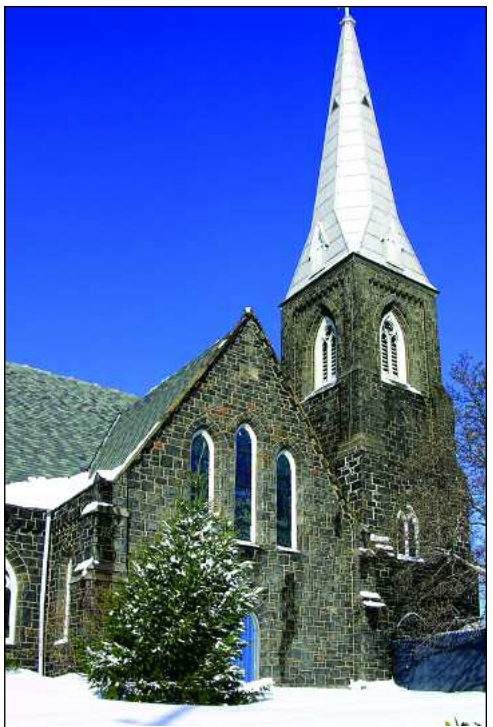

Children, Changes, and Old Friends

This has been a busy summer, but a good one—for our diocese, for my family, and for me. I am an unabashed fan of summer. The warm weather doesn't phase me. Twilight evening walks offer a fleeting beauty unique to the season. The Delaware beaches, even when they are crowded, are wonderful.

Summer is a time for children. I only had to look out my office window to be reminded of this. The cathedral grounds are quiet on winter mornings; but, all summer long, neighborhood kids from the cathedral day camp played outside. At lunchtime I often ran into Episcopalians from other congregations who were dropping by to serve as volunteer reading mentors.

The cathedral is not alone. Whether they take the form of vacation Bible schools, day camps, or parents' morning out, many of our congregations now offer special summer ministries for children. Serving children is serving Christ. I am grateful that so many choose this important ministry.

There are few summer sights more beautiful than seeing the dining hall at Camp Arrowhead filled with kids. In fact the dining hall and the camp itself have been full for most sessions of the 2007 camping season. There is such a good spirit in the place. Much credit goes to Walt LaFontaine and the camp staff for the work that they do. This summer Walt celebrates his 25th anniversary as director of Camp Arrowhead. During these years thousands of young people and their families have been blessed by this ministry.

This has been a summer of transition for many of our clergy and congregations. Several of our senior clergy have retired after long ministries as parish priests. At the same time, several other diocesan priests received calls to significant new ministries. It is an honor when clergy trained and serving in Delaware accept new responsibilities. But, it does keep us busy.

Recruiting clergy and supporting congregations in the call process is my top priority as bishop. Partnership is a fundamental requirement for doing this work well. Over the last months I have spent much time with wardens, search committee chairs, and parish vestries. I continue to grow in my admiration and respect for their commitment to the Church and faith in Christ. Our diocesan deployment officer, Gary Rowe, and I have met and interviewed clergy interested in coming to Delaware. I have great respect for their faithfulness and gifts. Interim clergy, supply clergy, and search consultants play a unique role in supporting congregations and guiding the search process. We always want to be sure that the Diocese of Delaware is known as a good place to worship, work, and serve. I am grateful that this is happening.

Don't forget that Gary Rowe and I are always happy to receive recommendations of clergy you know and admire. Some of the most gifted clergy have come to our diocese because of your recommendations.

We are also training our own candidates for ordained ministry. Over the last nine years, 13 Delawareans have been ordained

to the priesthood. Some are serving here. Others have been called to ministries in other dioceses. Jennifer Andrews-Weckerly, from the Cathedral Church of St. John, begins her second year at Virginia Seminary this month. Another recent graduate of the University of Delaware served as a ministry intern at Camp Arrowhead this summer.

In July I met individually with the eight candidates for our new diocesan deacons' training program. Deacons are ministers ordained to special vocations of Christian service and prayer. Our deacon candidates come from congregations across Delaware. The candidates will begin formal training this fall. They are a very impressive group. They come from many backgrounds and bring real gifts to this ministry. I very much enjoyed the time I spent with them.

In June my wife, Holly, and I traveled to Williamsburg, Virginia. I had been invited to preach at Bruton Parish Church as part of the 400th observance of the English settlement at Jamestown. I grew up in Williamsburg and was ordained there almost 30 years ago. It was good being with family and old friends.

That same week Bishop Martin Shaw and his wife, Elspeth, visited Delaware from our companion diocese of Argyll and The Isles. They were here to join St. Peter's Church, Lewes in the 300th anniversary celebration. The Shaw's visit reminded me again of how important our friendships with other Anglicans have been through the years. Many remember the powerful experience of Delaware's relationship with the Diocese of Pretoria, South Africa. Before that there were relationships with Haiti and the Dominican Republic. We are all aware that our communion has been the source of difficulties and disagreements in recent years. This same communion is also the source of many, many blessings.

With summer about to end, the busier fall season lies ahead. As always you are in my prayers. Whatever the season of the year may be, I feel blessed to serve with you.

us and a unique dependence on the kindness of strangers for them.

As such, the Seamen's Center of Wilmington's mission is simple: "To meet the needs of the seafarers who visit the Ports in the State of Delaware. The goal is to make their time in port a rewarding one by providing personal, practical, and spiritual assistance. A warm welcome is extended to ease the pain of loneliness and isolation and to offer a respite from the hazards of the sea."

According to Joan Lyons, Executive Director, "Volunteers are critical to our mission—we simply could not achieve it without their help." More than 50 volunteers from a variety of faith communities work at the Center, some for an hour or two each month and others committing five days a week. The folks who staff the desk and provide driving assistance to seafarers anchor the volunteer "crew," while many volunteers contribute their talents in gardening, computer and administrative

tasks, bike repair, fundraising, etc. "Whatever gifts and time people bring to us, we find a way to use them in this ministry," says Lyons, "It's amazing to see how even the smallest taste of kindness or 'normalcy' can have a profound effect on the seamen."

One of the Center's most faithful volunteers and advocates is Bill Corbishley (Grace Episcopal Church, Wilmington), who helped to found the Center in 1990. "Bill is one of those rare, tireless people who just seems to gain energy the more he does," says Lyons. "He's here five days a week, and I simply don't know what I'd do without him!"

For Bill, the rewards are obvious. "In most volunteer efforts you receive more than you give. Here at the Center I get to see nearly every day that my efforts bring smiles to strangers' faces. I've met thousands of men over the last 17 years and continue to correspond with many."
